



Report on EURAM 23 Conference

I am writing to provide you with a comprehensive report on my attendance at the EURAM 23 conference, which took place from 14th to 16th June at Trinity Business School in Dublin, Ireland. The conference proved to be an invaluable opportunity for me to expand my knowledge, interact with experts in my field, and receive constructive feedback on my research. Theme of the EURAM 23 Conference: The EURAM 23 conference revolved around the theme of "Transforming Business for Good." This theme emphasized the growing importance of ethical and sustainable practices in the business world. Additionally, I had the opportunity to participate in the "Meet the Editors" session, where I interacted with esteemed editors from renowned journals. Notably, I had a productive discussion with Professor Daniel Muzio, the General Editor of the Journal of Management Studies. He spoke highly of Indian scientific accomplishments and informed me about his upcoming visit to INDAM 2024 in India. The "Meet the Editors" session provided valuable insights into the publication process and preferences of different journals. I would like to share the key takeaways from this session:

• Phenomenon-driven research tends to make significant contributions and has a higher chance of publication.

- Good theory emerges through involvement with the subject at hand, rather than from a gap in the literature.
- Journals may reject papers that excessively focus on specialization rather than general management implications, fail to follow the journal's checklist, or have descriptive literature reviews.
- Journal of Management Studies prefers strong theoretical orientations.
- Organizational Studies encourages qualitative research and favors studies with strong societal implications.

In addition to the "Meet the Editors" session, I had the privilege of attending the "Plenary Session." This session featured four editors from top OB/HR and general management journals, focusing on successful publication strategies. I engaged in fruitful discussions with Professor Brandon Randolph-Seng and Professor Thomas Garavan, who provided valuable guidance related to my research.

Day Three: The final day of the conference marked a significant milestone for me as I presented my paper in the OB/HR track during the "Wellbeing at Workplace" session. My research aimed to analyze the review of wellbeing among healthcare professionals in the context of business and management literature. The presentation generated constructive feedback from the audience, who found the findings interesting. However, I acknowledge that there is room for improvement, and I will use this feedback to refine my research further.

Overall Observations and Takeaways: Attending the EURAM 23 conference was a transformative experience for me, and I am grateful to my mentors and co-authors, Professor Ajoy K. Dey and Professor Shreya Mishra, for encouraging me to participate. The conference not only provided a platform to present my research but also allowed me to learn from experts and connect with a vibrant community in my field. Key observations and takeaways from the conference include:
